Japan

Today we want to focus our prayers on two of our Southern Baptist missionaries who serve in one of the world's most difficult mission fields. Japan. The gospel has been accepted widely in some Asian countries, such as South Korea or even China. But Japan has few Christians.

Carlton and Cornelia Walker have served in Japan more than 40 years. They are still praying that revival will come to Japan — a revival that would see millions come to Christ.

For most Japanese people, though, cultural tradition and commitment are strong factors. To become a Christian, they think, would dishonor their ancestors and make them less Japanese. In more recent years, the Walkers have been encouraged by an increased openness to the gospel by some Japanese they meet. They hope the Olympics, now set for 2021 in Tokyo, might be a great push for the gospel.

Let's be thankful today that our International Mission Board sends missionaries to the hard places that will become tomorrow's harvest fields. Our church supports the board and we support our missionaries, the Walkers, through our Cooperative Program giving.

Let's pray for the Walkers and ask God to send a mighty revival to Japan!

Steve & Amy Morgan

New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary

As we pray today, let's think about getting prepared. Go to a medical doctor and you know that doctor studied very hard to become a physician. Call someone to fix your furnace, and you hope that repair person was trained and knows what to do. How about someone who is going to minister for Christ? Well, most of us know that a school for pastors and missionaries is a seminary. We Baptists support six outstanding seminaries. They have a total of more than 18,000 students.

Steve and Amy Morgan wanted to prepare for a lifetime of ministry so they went to New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary. That's one of our six schools. He got a master's degree and she got a PhD. in counseling.

Steve and Amy were appointed Southern Baptist missionaries and were sent to Italy. They got there just before the COVID-19 pandemic struck in 2020, killing thousands. Steve and Amy are safe, but they have been on hold for months.

Today let's thank God for New Orleans as it trains hundreds of future ministers and missionaries every year.

Let's pray for Steve and Amy — and ask God that they can put their training to good use for Christ!

Central Asia

Today in our prayer time, let's pray for Winfield and Lori Scott. That's not their real names but they're our missionaries serving in Central Asia. Our church supports them through our Cooperative Program giving.

Mostly our missionaries focus on planting churches and sharing the gospel. But an important part of missionary service is to make sure the pastors and other leaders of local churches are strong in faith.

The Scotts saw that many people across Central Asia have marriage problems. Unfortunately that includes many in the churches. So the Scotts led a marriage retreat for national pastors and their wives. It was the first time for such a retreat. Winfield and Lori taught that people must be strong in Christ as individuals before they can improve life with their spouses.

Sometimes men met separately from the women. When the women were alone, Lori saw that the older women counseled the younger ones.

Let's pray for Winfield and Lori as they lead in Central Asia. Let's ask the Lord to keep their own marriage solid as they help others.

And let's join our missionaries in praying for healthy marriages and families in churches across Central Asia.





Sean and Lydia Stevenson

Chicago, Illinois

Let's pray today for one of our North American missionary couples that our church is happy to support through the Cooperative Program: They are Sean and Lydia Stevenson.

Sean is from New Mexico, Lydia from Arkansas. They have years of church planting experience. They are planting a new church called Elmwood Park Community Church. It's in Greater Chicago, though technically they are in the village of Oak Park, northwest of central Chicago.

They were able to launch their new work in the building of a church which had closed, as most other churches in Oak Park have sadly done. Sean and Lydia are especially qualified to serve here, since many of the local residents are of Polish or Central European background. Sean and Lydia served eight years in Poland as Southern Baptist missionaries, so they speak Polish.

But about half their new members are Hispanic, so Sean is studying Spanish.


This mixture of people is typical in Chicago, the nation's third largest city, with some 10 million residents. Evangelical Christians number less than a million, so new churches are badly needed.

Chiang Mai, Thailand

Today in our prayer time, we will pray for two of our missionaries we'll call Victor and Madeline. They serve in Chiang Mai, Thailand. But they are there to reach the many Deaf people in that large city. Our church's Cooperative Program giving helps them serve there.

Victor and Madeline have planted a new church for Deaf people. But they also teach Deaf people to plant new Deaf churches.

When we see translating for the Deaf into sign language, we may assume all sign language is the same. No, there are many types of sign language around the world.

Two local Deaf people, Sombai and Alisara attended a church which provided signed interpretation of messages.

But the church used a slow word-for-word system that was hard for the two to follow. They saw that the Hawthornes use Thai Sign Language to translate the Bible exactly — and they understood. Sombai and Alisara became part of the new church. Then the Hawthornes trained them to go plant a new church for the Deaf.

Let's pray for Victor and Madeline, because we want everyone to hear the gospel — whatever that takes!





Andy Greenfield

Baltimore, Maryland

Andy Greenfield is our North American missionary we are going to pray for today. Andy is lead pastor of a new church called Village Station North Church. It is in the center of Baltimore, Maryland. They meet in the building of a Baptist church which had declined in numbers — leaders gave their building to the new church.

Andy and his team are working hard to build a growing congregation as they reach out to the community. Andy and his wife, Rhonda, have three children.

Baltimore has more than half a million residents — but that number is lower now than it used to be. Many people have left the city because of its problems. Andy and other church leaders are especially focused on bringing people of many backgrounds together under the cross of Christ.

Our North American Mission Board has sent many church planters to Baltimore because the needs are so great.

Our church is helping support Andy and our missions board as they work to share Christ in Baltimore.

Let's pray for Andy and his family. And let's ask the Lord to grow a church that will stand strong for Christ in Baltimore.

Ross is one of several missionaries sent by our International Mission Board to serve at Redeemer Church. That church is seeking to reach the thousands of refugees who have been resettled here.

They have fled from Yemen, Syria and many other places to find safety. Some come from countries closed to our missionaries. In Wales, our missionaries have a unique opportunity to tell them about Jesus. The church is succeeding! People from 18 nations attend services.

Our church supports Ross in this hard assignment through our Cooperative Program giving. But our church also helped prepare him for it. Our church supports Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in Fort Worth, Texas — also through the Cooperative Program.

Ross earned two degrees there to train him for his ministry in Wales.

Let's pray for Ross now and let's thank God for the great work Southwestern is doing to prepare men and women for ministry in some very hard places.

Chase and Laura Feindel

Vista, California

For our prayer time today, let's focus on the West Coast. Chase and Laura Feindel are our North American missionaries serving in Vista, California. That's about a 40-minute drive north of San Diego. Nearly 100,000 people live in the Vista area.

Vista is a beautiful area near the Pacific, but few people follow Christ. Out of more than three million people who live in and around San Diego, only about 10 percent say they are evangelical Christians. Literally hundreds of new churches are needed.

Chase and Laura have set up home groups and they try many things to make their new church known in the community. During the pandemic of 2020, they kept meeting when they could do so safely, but moved to outside gatherings at a ranch-type conference center.

Our North American Mission Board has sent a number of missionaries like Chase and Laura to the San Diego area because of the great spiritual needs. More are needed. About 40 million people live in California. It's one of our greatest missions challenges.

Our church supports Chase and Laura through our Cooperative Program giving as they try to meet that challenge. Let's pray for them now.

Calgary, Alberta, Canada

Let's go to western Canada today so we can pray for two of our Southern Baptist missionaries. They are James and Jen Cho. Our church supports them through our Cooperative Program giving.

James and Jen are serving in Calgary, which is a striking city of skyscrapers standing above the plains. The Rocky Mountains march across the horizon. It's a modern city of more than a million people — Canada's third largest. Yet culturally many people here people hang on to the idea of cowboys and western culture. The Calgary Stampede, the world's biggest rodeo, is held here. But, like most of Canada, few here follow Christ. Calgary is a mission field. James and Jen are in northwestern Calgary, where they have planted The Vine Church.

Both James and Jen are Korean background, so they understand what it's like to move to a new nation as so many have done in Canada.

Our missionaries have been able to share the gospel with many immigrants and bring them into the church. Growth prospects for The Vine Church look good.

Let's ask God's blessings on James and Jen, so they can help many come to Christ.

Denver, Colorado

Today we're going out west to the Rocky Mountains for our prayer time. We're going to pray for Chris and Libby Phillips, who have planted a new church in the Denver area. Our North American Mission Board is sending many missionaries to Denver because of the spiritual needs there.

Chris and Libby are two of those missionaries we support through our Cooperative Program giving. Their new church is called Journey Point Church and it's six miles northeast of downtown Denver in the Stapleton area.

This is one of the biggest new housing developments in the country — 75,000 new homes are being built. Most of those houses will be young families with an average of two children each. So we can see their new church is urgently needed.

Chris and Libby are from Tennessee; they have four children. Chris worked in medical sales until the Lord called him into full-time service. They have developed their own app to keep in touch with members.

Let's pray that Chris and Libby and that new church will help folks in Stapleton to look even higher than the Rockies — all the way to Heaven — as they come in faith to Christ!

Matthew and Ana are Hispanic in background, but Matthew grew up in Aptos, a town about 30 miles north of Salinas.

Our church is supporting Dave and Mary through our Cooperative Program giving. We also support our North American Mission Board as its leaders coordinate planting new churches across North America.

Japan

Most of us watch at least some of the Olympics, wherever the games are held in the world. Today, let's make the Olympics part of our prayer time.

Remember that the Olympics were to have been held in Tokyo, Japan, in 2020. But they were rescheduled to summer, 2021. Daniel and Tara Rice are two of our Southern Baptist missionaries in Japan. Their whole ministry has been to ensure that the thousands of people who come to the games will also hear the gospel of Jesus Christ.

Our church supports Daniel and Tara through our Cooperative Program giving. Japanese churches will host parties in which local residents can come and watch the games. Some churches will have festivals. All these events will include sharing the gospel.

Just outside one Olympic venue, the Rices and Japanese Christians will set up an outreach hub to share the gospel. There will be a full court press, so to speak, of following up with all who show an interest in the gospel.

Let's pray that, as the world comes to see the greatest athletes compete, they will also hear the world's absolutely greatest story about how Jesus was sent to bring salvation.



Edwin and Melinda Pacheco

Brooklyn, New York

Some missionaries get sent to exotic places far from home. But God tells others to stay where they are. We're praying today for Edwin and Melinda Pacheco, two of our North American missionaries who serve in Brooklyn, New York. Our church supports them through the Cooperative Program.

Both of them were born and grew up in Brooklyn. That's where they're raising their two daughters. And it's not just Brooklyn — it's the Red Hook neighborhood down by the East River — just across the river from the Statue of Liberty.

Most tourists won't venture into Red Hook, where drugs, poverty and other big city problems sit on about every street corner. This is where Edwin and Melinda have planted Redemption Church. The building is on Hicks Street at West 9th.

The church tackled poverty by setting up a powerful food ministry. They've gone all out to help the neighborhood.

But Redemption lives up to its name, because redemption is what spiritually hungry people want to feast on, even if they don't know what that is.

It's Christian redemption Edwin offers the neighborhood through his preaching and on-the-street dialogues.

Ben & Christy Prater

Poland

Today we want to pray for two of our missionaries who serve in Poland. We'll call them Ben and Christy Prater. Their work is sensitive, so we won't use their real names. But our church is supporting them through our Cooperative Program giving.

It's sensitive because their ministry is sharing the gospel with Jewish people who still live in Poland, 75 years after the Holocaust. Their number has been growing in recent years. Ben and Christy want to see Jews accept Jesus as the Messiah foretold in the Old Testament.

Jews who accept Jesus as their Savior are often called Messianic Jews. There are many Messianic Jews around the world, including in the United States and even Israel.

Sadly, there are few Messianic Jews in Poland these days. Ben says it's estimated that 250,000 Messianic Jews were killed in the Holocaust. Two of Christy's great-uncles were killed in Auschwitz, the infamous Holocaust death camp near Kraków, Poland.

Ben and Christy have learned to speak Hebrew so they can tell the Jews of Poland about their Messiah who overcame death to bring salvation.

Let's pray for our missionaries as they serve there in Poland.





Ebbie Davis

California

Today in our prayer time we want to pray for one of our home missionaries serving in San Diego, California. Her name is Ebbie Davis. Now, you're thinking San Diego is a great place to live, right? No doubt. But it's also a very difficult mission field. More than three million people live in and around San Diego and fewer than 10 percent are evangelical Christians. There are many Hispanics but also people from many lands.

Ebbie first went to San Diego through our North American Mission Board. The board has a program called NextGen. It sends Christian college students to missions sites in North America. The students help plant new churches and work alongside home missionaries. Now Ebbie is working with eight NextGen students in the San Diego area, helping plant a new church where hundreds of new churches are needed.

Our church supports our North American Mission Board and the NextGen program just as we are supporting our missionary Ebbie Davis — all through our Cooperative Program giving.

Let's pray that more students will be called to missions and see firsthand how the gospel can change lives. And let's pray for Ebbie as she works with those students there in San Diego.





Bethany Forrester

South Asia

Today we will pray for one of our missionaries in South Asia. We will call her Bethany, but that's not her real name. I think you'll agree her ministry is a huge challenge and she needs prayer support!

Asian languages are known to be hard to learn. But Bethany is a missionary to Deaf people. She has had to learn the special sign language used by South Asia's millions of Deaf people. Bethany meets with Deaf people every week and tells Bible stories. Deaf people love stories and the Bible is filled with great ones. Many of the Deaf accept that the Bible is true.

But deciding to follow Jesus is a hard choice for people here. They fear they may be cut off from their families or jobs. They fear they may not be able to marry.

Let's pray for our missionary we're calling Bethany. Let's ask God to keep her safe in a dangerous part of the world. Let's ask God to give her wisdom as she shares the gospel with people who fear earthly consequences more than they fear eternal ones.

Our church supports Bethany through our Cooperative Program giving. Let's pray for her now.





Johnny & Donna Maust

Ecuador

Today in our prayer time we want to pray for two of our missionaries who serve way south of the border. Johnny and Donna Maust serve in Ecuador, which sits on the upper left side of South America. Our church supports them down there through our Cooperative Program giving.

Now, Johnny is a fine missionary, but today we're going to focus on Donna. The story started when Donna wanted to get to know people in the town where they moved. She entered a cooking contest. And her light-but-rich strawberry cheese pie won second place! The pie was so good a government leader asked her to teach cooking classes in his house. That led to Bible studies. Those went so well that a church was planted.

Next Donna learned to make soap and started classes teaching women how to make it. Twelve women started a company to make the soap and sell it to hotels and stores. See? Even cheese pie and soap can help us share the gospel and plant a new church if we follow Donna's example.

Let's ask God's blessings on Johnny and Donna! And let's stand by to see what Donna does next!

George planted a church that multiplied, so he is experienced. He teaches many topics, from church planting to family life. He and Joy have six kids, so family is important to them.

George is always looking for church planters who may be called to New Orleans. He wants to see all New Orleans know Christ.

Our church supports George and Joy and all those other church planters through our Cooperative Program giving. Let's pray now for them now.

Nearly six and a half million people live in the Toronto area — and more than two million of those were born outside Canada. Many Hispanics live here. J.D. has met Spanish speakers from many nations within a few blocks of the church.

Let's pray for our missionaries, J.D. and Andreina, as they serve the Lord and grow that new church. Let's pray that many will be saved and that those will grow in the Lord.



Cole Ethridge

Africa

Our missionaries face dangers most of us never encounter — and cannot imagine. Today we are going to pray for one of our missionaries who has served 32 years in Africa. We'll call him Cole.

Let's run through some of what Cole has faced in those 32 years. He has ministered during a war, and during a genocide in which many people were murdered. Twice people tried to overthrow the government in the nation where he served. He has seen political insurrection and terrorist attacks. More than once he stood up to armed bandits. He ministered to Christians who faced religious persecution. Once he himself lived on the street so he could serve others there. He was evacuated during a rebel attack. He battled and survived cancer. He survived an epidemic of meningitis. In 2020 he ministered in unique ways during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Now, Cole prayed in the early days for God to send him anywhere but Africa. But that's where he has served for 32 years — and he is still there. God has been faithful.

Our church has supported Cole all those years — through all those situations — through our Cooperative Program giving.

Let's pray for him now.





JC & Sylvia Nava

Phoenix, Arizona

Let's pull on our boots and head to Phoenix, Arizona, for our prayer time. That's where JC and Sylvia Nava are planting a new church called My City Church Phoenix. Our church is helping plant that new church — because our Cooperative Program dollars are helping support JC and Sylvia.

We probably think of Phoenix as a city in the desert that's mostly retired people. Well, the desert part is true. But the average age for people in Phoenix is 32 — which is younger than the national average. Sadly, Phoenix also knows less about the Bible than almost any other U.S. city. Evangelical churches are few.

That's why the ministry of JC and Sylvia is important. Many Hispanics live in the Phoenix area. JC and Sylvia came to Phoenix from Mexico, so speak Spanish. But they want to reach all kinds of people, wherever they are from.

JC and Sylvia partner with the Valley Rim Baptist Association of churches in Phoenix, and also with our North American Mission Board.

Spiritual needs are so great in Phoenix, it takes all of us — including our church — to reach the city. Let's pray now for JC and Sylvia.

They are planting a new church in San Mateo, California, which is about 20 miles south of San Francisco. It's just north of San José — many tech companies are based throughout this area.

Jeremy and Sarah call their new church Refuge Community Church. Members have been doing outreach in the city and also provide help to needy people. The church says they are not just IN the city, but they're a church FOR the city.

Only about 10 percent of the people in the San Francisco area have connections to an evangelical church. But a whopping third of the people have no religious connection at all — many say they are atheists.

Jeremy says many people have not truly rejected God, but have rejected a false image of Him. They want to connect with people enough that the real truth of the gospel can touch lives.

Our church is helping support Jeremy and Sarah in this new church through our Cooperative Program giving.

Let's pray the Lord will keep them and their three children in His will.

Every year hundreds of Southern Baptist churches close up and die. Often the congregation gets older and stops being evangelistic. Attendance drops. Contributions dwindle. The doors close for good.

But these days many churches are being brought back from death or near death. Our North American Mission Board has a whole program of restarting churches that are expiring.

Starke, Florida, is a town inland from St. Augustine. That's where Cornerstone Baptist Church had died. Was it truly dead. Yes — the building sat empty and unused for two years.

Then local Baptists tried a replant. They called Joey Hay to come restart the church. People began attending the newly reborn church. A year later attendance was averaging 60 each Sunday. A dead church was thriving.

Our church supports our North American Mission Board and missionaries like Joey through our Cooperative Program giving. That includes restarting dead churches.

Think about it: Our Lord knows a lot about coming back to life! Bringing a dead church back to life is not difficult for Him!

Edward and Terri Janklow

Southeast Asia

If we asked, I'm guessing we would find most of us don't like to wait on stuff. We don't like waiting on people. We don't like waiting on anything. Today, we are going to pray for one of our missionary couples who had to wait on the Lord to act.

We'll call them Edward and Terri, but those are not their real names. They serve in Southeast Asia, where missionaries are not welcome. Our church supports them through our Cooperative Program giving.

She'll tell you about the Bible study she and another missionary led and how a girl named Ana came. After Ana studied the Bible and asked many questions, she committed her life to Christ.

Africa

Our missionaries we pray for today serve in Africa.

Jay and Kathy train leaders in local churches, so those leaders in turn can go share the gospel with other groups.

Jay teaches the pastors how to use stories about David in the Old Testament. The men have seen conflicts like David did, so the stories work well for them.

One man named Victor formerly served as a guide for the national president. When he heard the story of David and Bathsheba, he told Jay he had been places where the same sort of thing happened.

Our church supports Jay and Kathy way over in Africa because part of the money we give through the Cooperative Program finds its way to them.

Let's pray for their safety as they enable lost people to hear the gospel.

Our students pay much lower tuition than students at other schools, because our Cooperative Program helps lower costs.


Let's pray for our missionary we're calling Jay.

That history will include a 2017 meeting which our missionary, Jeremiah Farmer, led. That’s not his real name, of course. But we are going to pray for him today.

Jeremiah’s missionary team worked with national church leaders across East Asia to develop a new type of training that would enable every believer to become a witness.

Leaders from many countries gathered for an important meeting to decide on the new method. The meeting did not seem to go well at first. But finally the leaders decided to fully adopt it.

Two years later, in early 2019, the church leaders reported what had happened:

More than 3,500 church members were trained — and more than 3,000 people came to faith in Christ. Some 1,300 new believers had been baptized and 156 new churches planted!

Our church sort of “invests” our mission dollars in Jeremiah — and these miraculous results for God’s Kingdom are our spiritual earnings. It’s too soon to know if this great beginning will continue across East Asia.

But let’s pray today that it will. Let’s ask God to guide Jeremiah and continue to work through him.



John and Lois Wang

Argentina

Today we are going to pray for two of our missionaries who probably will affect the future of Argentina.

Our church supports them through our Cooperative Program giving, even in Argentina, which is on the bottom tip of South America.

John and Lois Wang are reaching university students for Christ at two major universities in Buenos Aires.

Normally the Wangs would have become campus ministers. But the big schools in Argentina don't allow outsiders to have access to students.

So John and Lois became professors! John teaches engineering at one school and Lois teaches Korean at another. That way they can talk freely to students.

Still, it is a slow process because most students resist talk about Jesus. But John dreams of lining up whole networks of churches to start reaching out to students and providing Bible studies.

That network got started in 2019 with three churches. John and Lois are training the church leaders.

Let's pray for John and Lois and ask that God help thousands of university students come to faith in Christ.

Let's pray that later those believers will turn the entire nation of Argentina towards Christ!





Kirk and Karen Kirkland

Cincinnati, Ohio

Today we want to pray for a home missionary couple called to inner city Cincinnati, Ohio, to plant a church.

They are Kirk and Karen Kirkland.

Kirk says they were living in Dayton, Ohio, maybe an hour's drive north of Cincinnati — and they were comfortable there. When he felt called to plant a new church, he thought it would be about anywhere but Cincinnati.

But the new church has grown. Kirk says planting a new church as a Southern Baptist was much easier than having an unaffiliated church.

He says as a pastor, you don't have to be alone, because there are other Southern Baptists who will provide support and encouragement.

About two million people live in and around Cincinnati and only about 13 percent have ties to an evangelical church. The challenge is massive.

Let's pray that the new church Kirk has launched will grow non-stop and help thousands find faith in Christ.

Our church is supporting home missionaries like the Kirklands in other parts of Cincinnati and in most of the major midwest cities like it — all through our Cooperative Program giving.

Let's pray for Kirk and Karen now.





Mojic and Munko Baldandorj

California

Today we're going to pray for two of our home missionaries who came to America from Mongolia.

That's a huge country in north central Asia — between China and Russia.

Our missionaries are Mojic and Munko Baldandorj. They became Christians while still in Mongolia and later came to America to plant churches among the estimated 25,000 to 40,000 Mongolians who live here now.

First they helped re-start a church in Denver, Colorado. Now they are planting a new church in Oakland, California. Our church is supporting them through our Cooperative Program giving.

One of the main ways they will engage with people from Mongolia is through basketball, one of their favorite sports. Also, Mojic will meet with newcomer Mongolians and help them adjust to life in America.

Most Mongolians are Buddhist and cling to that as a bit of home. But Mojic and Baldandorj want them to have a relationship with Jesus Christ, not just follow teachings.

Let's pray for this couple and their family as they serve in California. Let's ask God to strengthen their witness so many will come to faith in Christ.

The new church has done well. They started with a launch team of 35 people — but that number tripled within a few months.


Price says they're eager to see what God is doing to do with them. He says they disciple new believers who will disciple more new believers.

Malawi

Two of our missionaries in Malawi, Matt and Catherine Allison, met with a group of widows in 2020 and were able to distribute more than 80 pounds of food to the widows and their children. This was a group called *Hope for Widows*. It was started by a Baptist woman named Amess. While she and her husband were students at the Baptist Theological Seminary, her husband died. So at age 26, Amess was a widow.

Hope for Widows teaches women how to survive and provides Bible teaching on coping. Our missionary, Catherine, was able to speak to the widows and assure them of God's faithfulness, despite sickness, death or famine.

Our church helps support Matt and Catherine through the Cooperative Program. Our Southern Baptist churches also provided the money to buy food for those widows.

Let's pray for our missionaries and for those widows.

Scotland

We are praying today for two of our missionaries in Scotland. They are Patrick and Erin Schwartz, who have served there about three years.

They live in Glasgow, Scotland's capital, with their two young daughters. Our church supports them through our Cooperative Program giving.
