Our mission board is partnering with churches and other agencies to translate Bible stories into sign language. They want to translate 300 Bible stories into every sign language. Putting the Bible into story form is a really effective way for Deaf people to understand it. That's why they will focused on stories.

Mark and Vesta have served in Europe and Asia in their efforts to reach Deaf people. Mark's a whiz at sign language. But Vesta's parents were Deaf; she learned to sign before she learned to speak English. When Vesta was 8, she would read the Bible and sign the verses for her father. She saw how the gospel made him a better man when he became a believer.

Aren't you glad our church supports missionaries like Mark and Vesta through the Cooperative Program? Let's pray for them and their ministry to the Deaf.

Our board is the contact point for more than 3,700 Southern Baptist chaplains of many kinds, including military ones. The board also provides regular training for chaplains.

Samuel moves around a lot because he often deploys with our sailors, sailing around the world for months at a time. That means he has time to get to know the sailors he serves. He provides regular worship services, but also stands ready to provide counseling and other help if a sailor is battling depression or facing family problems. When based in Spain, Samuel made the news when he helped develop a food distribution system to help locals during COVID-19.

Samuel says his mother used to tell him God had a beautiful plan for him to serve in ministry. But he could not see himself as a pastor or missionary. After he joined the U.S. Navy at age 24, he soon started serving as a chaplain's assistant. Later, he became a chaplain and realized his mother's vision had been accurate. Let's pray for our chaplain today, wherever he is. He's our missionary to the military.



Samuel Ravelo

Q Chaplain ⋅ March 12, 2023

Let's pay attention today because the man we will pray for moves around a lot. That's because Commander Samuel Ravelo is a Southern Baptist chaplain in the U.S. Navy. Our church does not help pay the salary of Samuel — not beyond our taxes — but our Cooperative Program giving does support our North American Mission Board. Our board is the contact point for more than 3,700 Southern Baptist chaplains of many kinds, including military ones. The board also provides regular training for chaplains.

Samuel moves around a lot because he often deploys with our sailors, sailing around the world for months at a time. That means he has time to get to know the sailors he serves. He provides regular worship services, but also stands ready to provide counseling and other help if a sailor is battling depression or facing family problems. When based in Spain, Samuel made the news when he helped develop a food distribution system to help locals during COVID-19.

Samuel says his mother used to tell him God had a beautiful plan for him to serve in ministry. But he could not see himself as a pastor or missionary. After he joined the U.S. Navy at age 24, he soon started serving as a chaplain's assistant. Later, he became a chaplain and realized his mother's vision had been accurate. Let's pray for our chaplain today, wherever he is. He's our missionary to the military.

Puerto Rico · March 19, 2023

For our missions prayer time today, let's pray for two of our missionaries serving on the island of Puerto Rico. They are Roy and Vilmarie Vidal — our church supports them through our Cooperative Program giving. Roy and Vilmarie have planted a new church, Path of Grace Baptist Church, in the city of Villalba. It's about a 35-minute drive through the mountains down to the larger city of Ponce on the island's south coast. Roy, Vilmarie and their two young children moved from Venezuela to Puerto Rico and settled in Villalba. There are Catholic churches in town, but the nearest Baptist church was far away. When they talked about the distance, their pastor encouraged them to plant a new church.

So they did, in 2021. Other Puerto Rican Baptist pastors pitched in and our North American Mission Board provided training and support. These days the church sends out witnessing teams to introduce locals to Jesus and the new church. Church teams have also been busy helping rebuild homes damaged or destroyed by Hurricane Maria. Note that our North American Mission Board's Send Relief program has helped them.

The area around Villalba suffered heavy damage from the high winds and mud slides. Roy has found that many locals are senior citizens; many of them lived in the United States but returned here to retire. Let's pray for Roy and Vilmarie. Let's pray their church will grow and impact their entire city.

When they talked about the distance, their pastor encouraged them to plant a new church.

So they did, in 2021. Other Puerto Rican Baptist pastors pitched in and our North American Mission Board provided training and support. These days the church sends out witnessing teams to introduce locals to Jesus and the new church. Church teams have also been busy helping rebuild homes damaged or destroyed by Hurricane Maria. Note that our North American Mission Board's Send Relief program has helped them.

The area around Villalba suffered heavy damage from the high winds and mud slides. Roy has found that many locals are senior citizens; many of them lived in the United States but returned here to retire. Let's pray for Roy and Vilmarie. Let's pray their church will grow and impact their entire city.







Robert & Danielle Kane

Ohio · March 26, 2023

Today, let's pray for two missionaries our church supports in Ohio. Robert and Danielle Kane have planted a new church in Westerville, a city of some 40,000 people on the northern edge of Columbus. This is just outside the I-270 beltline that circles that city.

All these have helped the church grow. So far, the Citizen Church meets Sundays in a school building, but small groups of members meet other times around the community.

It was at this time that the idea of implementing New Hope arose. New Hope, translated into Spanish as "Nueva Esperanza," is an initiative created by a group of church planters, counselors, and oral communicators with the goal of bringing healing to those who have gone through some type of traumatic experience.

New Hope's ministry aims to address this trauma by studying God's Word in groups of four to six who meet weekly for a total of seven sessions.
